Groups' Reports 2020 -2021

Leaders around Richmondshire have kept Scouting alive through their dedication and imagination in this difficult period. They have embraced the challenges and used many innovative ways of engaging with the young people despite lockdowns, social distancing and restrictions on numbers meeting.

1st Wensleydale have had many successful zoom sessions which included Beavers teaching other Beavers knots, video cooking, quizzes and used the county resources including learning about other countries with the County Commissioner, all without leaving home. When face-to-face activities have been allowed, the older sections have been brushing up on navigation skills, baked bean taste testing, archery and a caving trip. The Beavers have learnt how to light fires, tried tracking, planted sunflower and cooked some bannock bread and ration packs.

Catterick Garrison Scouts have met face-to-face, when permitted, and enjoyed various outdoor activities including carving soap, hikes including a trifle hike to collect ingredients for their trifle and using the what3words app and axe throwing. The Beavers have visited the fire station and Foxglove Covet. Beaver, who is presented to Beaver of the week, has had a fantastic time travelling to Locomotion at Shildon, South Park Darlington, Catterick Library, rugby training, visited 1st Battalion The Yorkshire Regiment and even been to the pictures to see Peter Rabbit all socially distanced.

Brompton on Swale Cubs have been set a series of challenges to complete at home, posting the results on OSM so working towards various badges. When meeting was allowed, a range of activities were run from the garden on different nights obeying the six of rule. During the last year some older Cubs have transferred to Scouts and Beavers moved up into the pack so carrying on their Scouting adventure. Several parents have come forward with offers to help, which will be very useful when more normal times return and more activities are permitted.

Swaledale Scouts have had many Zoom sessions including an online Q & A meeting with Chancellor of Exchequer, Rishi Sunak, to discuss the pandemic and local flooding issues. For the younger sections activities enjoyed were planting hyacinth bulbs, which were then left outside front doors for senior residents at Reeth for Christmas. When allowed, outdoor activities have included a Group archery day, hikes to develop map reading skills and building a bug hotel in Reeth Community Orchard.

1st Richmond Beavers have enjoyed a varied and exciting program with no meetings indoor yet: the weather has been kind. They have hiked from Round Howe to the scout hut, put up tents at Kiplin, used the climbing wall at Marrick priory and more locally have had a bike ride and played wide games. They have also undertaken several other activities involved finding out about local nature including pond dipping at Foxglove Covert.

Barton ended 2019 with Jane Davenport (GSL and Beaver leader) hanging up her necker after more than 20 years in the group: huge thanks to her for all her dedication. 2020 seemed to start normally with a round of winter camps but then face-to-face scouting ceased. When only online contact was possible, activities continued with Zoom games, quizzes, escape rooms and linkups with other sections and groups around the world. As soon as meeting in person became permitted, Covid risk assessments were gladly completed even though the outdoors in autumn prove very wet. All sections have loved being back outdoors face-to-face, doing things together and being active which is core to what makes Scouting.

Castle Explorer report 2020-2021

This year wasn't the best for scouting but we did our best with what we had so Castle went online for part of the year with the focus being more on individual work on things that interest the explorers. When we have been meeting face to face, we have done some favourite activities like fire lighting, bush craft activities, hikes and some new activities like axe throwing. We have begun work on the global issues badge to be completed in the autumn term.

Our numbers have stayed constant throughout the year and the program has continued to be youth led. We also made the change to meeting every other week, the 2nd and 4th Thursday of the month, and this has worked much better.

I want to thank Ava and David for lending their time and knowledge to help run the explorers, and the explorers themselves because without them I would be sat talking to my self in a church hall for two hours every other week.
